Message From The Mayor's Desk

On Monday, April 13, 2024 millions of people on the North American Continent from Mexico to Canada were united in a special way as they gathered together to watch the Solar Eclipse. In Laurel people spread blankets on the grass of Market Street Park at a Solar Eclipse party hosted by the Laurel Library. For a few minutes racial and ethnic differences were overcome by the realization that we are part of something bigger than each of us. People donned their protective glasses and gazed skyward to watch the moon move across the sun and slowly block out the sunshine. In the main pathway of the eclipse the sky darkened, birds and other animals got confused, and most of the people marveled at the spectacle. I believe you would all agree, it would be nice if we could create those bonds of friendship between all people everyday.

We have several organizations working hard to move our population in that direction. Operation West Laurel, One Laurel, several churches, and the Community Engagement Unit of the Delaware Department of Justice are examples. State assistance is being provided to Laurel as a result of a visit by Governor John Carney to one of Operation West Laurel's meetings focused on reducing violence among our community's youth. The Community Engagement Unit led by Program Administer Corie Priest held a "Pop-Up" event at Little Creek Apartments on Friday, March 8th and a second "Pop-Up" event at Carvel Gardens Apartments on Friday, April 11th. A third "Pop-Up" is planned for Holly Brook Apartments. The goal is to strengthen families, encourage good decisions, and to build hope for a better future; a future that leads to good jobs for high school graduates or a pathway to college. There is a famous Chinese saying, "A journey of a 1000 miles starts with a single step". These "Pop-Up" events are a small, single step on our journey to a better, safer Laurel for all our citizens. We need everyone to help.

In addition to working on our social order, the Town continues to promote new business and residential development in the Route 13 corridor. The Laurel Redevelopment Corporation and the Laurel Historical Society are doing a great job restoring historical structures. New Park attractions are coming. Renovations to Dunbar school should be complete this year. Britt's restaurant had a "Help wanted" sign in the window. New buildings are being planned at the former Globe building and Rigbie Apartments sites.

Working together with the collegial spirit of the Eclipse watchers, we can do great things for this and future generations!

Know the Code



Bush, Grass, and Weed Highlights (Highlights of the Code Listed Below.)

Cutting or Removal of Weeds Required

Every owner of any area, lot or parcel of land shall cut, trim or otherwise remove or cause to be removed all weeds, grass, brush or vegetation more than six inches in height on any lot within the Town of Laurel unless said property is in agriculture production.

Notice

The Town of Laurel Code Enforcement Officer is hereby authorized to notify in writing via mail (Certificate of Mailing) the owner of the property, as determined by the official tax rolls of the Town of Laurel, to cut, remove, and destroy such grass and weeds, and/or remove and dispose of growing grass, cuttings, and other plants growing through, onto or over such sidewalks, driveways or streets from the subject property within seven (7) calendar days from mailing of said notice.

An owner of any property will be given only one notice per calendar year after which the Town shall cut the grass after each additional violation days.

Bush, Grass, and Weed: Repeat Offenders

On June 17, 2019 Mayor & Council passed a Resolution to amend the fee pertaining Grass and Weed Works Order. The resolution became effective July 1, 2019.

REPEAT OFFENDERS:

Each violation increases by 25%.

Town of Laurel's Special Event Request Form

It's that time of year where the days are longer, the flowers are in full bloom, the birds are chirping, and the town parks are holding various gatherings. If you wish to reserve one of the town's park you must submit a Special Event Request Form to Laurel Town Hall, 201 Mechanic Street.

Overview of Special Event Form:

The Special Event Form will inquire about your date, time, and location of your event. The form will also require a brief description of your event and the anticipated number of participants. The form will also require contact information needed for the approval process. The form also inquires if you would need any Town Services, which are optionable with a fee.

Registration Fee

The Town of Laurel requires a $\frac{$50.00}{}$ Registration Fee when the Special Event Request Form is submitted to the town office.

Town Services (Optionable)

- Electric: \$50.00 fee
- \bullet Trash Cans: \$25.00 per trash can after the 4th.
- Road Closings
- Police Services

(The Town Service Fee is Non-Refundable. Please review the weather before submitting payment.)

Approval Process:

Once the form is submitted to Town Hall the form is first reviewed by the Town Manager, Chief of Police, and the Public Works Director. Once the event is approved the individual is contacted with approval of their event.

Trash Bid Proposal Selected

The Town of Laurel's Mayor & Council awarded the trash bid to Deihm's Disposable for a 3-year period. Deihm's Disposable will continue to offer waste, recycle, and yard waste services to residents.

Tidewater Park Update

At April's Mayor & Council Meeting it was announced that Tidewater Park is near completion. The final stages including sight work and delivering of the playground equipment and installation. The park is expected to be completed in Summer.

What Is Tidewater Park?

Tidewater Park is a piece of the Ramble Project, where it will consist of a nature base playground. This park will be environmentally friendly due to its ability to produce a greener infrastructure and provide a stormwater management with a constructed wetland.

Tidewater Park:

Features 3 Playground Areas:

- A 5 to 12 year's old play area.
- A 2 to 5 year's old play area.
- A sensory area.



Town of Laurel's Downtown Development District (DDD)

Town of Laurel's History DDD District

The Town of Laurel designated their core downtown into the DDD in August of 2016. The DDD is a state program where it offers property owners local and state incentives within the designated district to rehab their homes, businesses, and investment properties. If you would like to take advantage of the incentives of having property within the DDD District please contact Laurel Town Hall at 302-875-2277,

Incentives Include:


- A town property tax abatement on improvements for five years.
- State Historic Tax Credits equal to 20% to 30% of the cost of rehabilitating homes, businesses, church, and non-profits.
- \bullet State Grant of up to \$50,000 or 20% of eligible expenses (Most "hard" costs)' minimum investment of \$15,000 required.
- Rebates of up to \$9,100 for residential energy efficiency improvements.
- Matching grants of up to \$10,000 per project from Sussex County.

Town of Laurel: DDD Expansion

At February's 2024 Mayor & Council Meeting it was noted that the town has 89 acres designated to the DDD and they're permitted to have 95 acres based on the town size. The property at 121 Delaware Avenue, where the Rosemont House resides on the corner of Delaware Avenue and Maryland Avenue will be incorporated in the towns DDD expansion. The town recommended to increase the DDD area on Delaware Avenue to include more of the historical homes in town. The DDD has been a huge asset to our town where many property owners have applied for funding.

The Town of Laurel's DDD District (MAP DATED AS OF 2017)

District includes portions of Central Avenue, Market Street, Second Street, E. Fourth Street, Poplar Street, Sixth Street, Delaware Avenue, and Pine Street.

Recycling:

- -West side of Town (Central Avenue is dividing line) Bi Weekly, Wednesday (starting July 3, 2024)
- -East Side of Town (Central Avenue is dividing line) Bi Weekly, Wednesday (starting July 10, 2024)

Deihm's Disposal will take up to three additional trash bags outside of the trash toter.

Please be advised any yard waste or recycling that is contaminated (standards set by Delaware Solid Waste Authority) will not be picked up. A list of permitted recycling materials can be obtained at Laurel Town Hall or online at https://dswa.com/residential-recycling-guidelines/




Town of Laurel National Public Works Week

National Smore's Day

The summer days are calling our names, which means longer days with an arrange of outdoor activities to enjoy. We happily store away our winter boots and coats, and we will pull out our shorts and flip flops to embrace the summer season. Summer truly wouldn't be summer without a bonfire in the evenings accompanied by our seasonal favorite simply known as a "Smore." The smore consists of a chocolate bar and a melty plush marshmallow smashed in between two graham crackers. The great debate over a smore's is whether your team lightly golden toasted marshmallow or team charred marshmallow to no return. Whichever way you prefer your marshmallow we can simply agree that smores are delicious and a cookout tradition.

History of Smores

Smores was first introduced as a dessert in approximately the 1920's where it was published by Campfire Marshmallows in a book of recipes. Campfire Marshmallows is known as the original marshmallow and they're still in business today. A smores wasn't officially named a smores it was first referred as a "Graham Cracker Sandwich." The Girl Scouts in 1972 published a similar recipe in Tramping and Trailing with the Girl Scouts known as "Some More," which finally led to the official name smores in the late 30's to the late 50's (National Today, n.d.)

Smore's Fun Facts

- Grand Rapids in Michigan is the city that records the maximum consumption of s'mores.
- In 2014, the world's largest s'more weighing 267 pounds was made in Pennsylvania.
- The graham cracker was invented in 1829 by Presbyterian minister Sylvester Graham in New Jersey.
- The records show that Americans buy 90 million pounds of marshmallows every year and almost 50 % of them are used to make s'mores.
- After the invention of The Hershey Bar in 1900, it began to be used as a chocolate layer in s'mores. Each section of the Hershey bar is called a pip and it takes six pips to make the traditional s'mores.
